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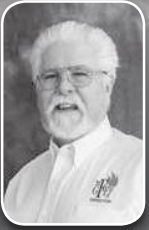

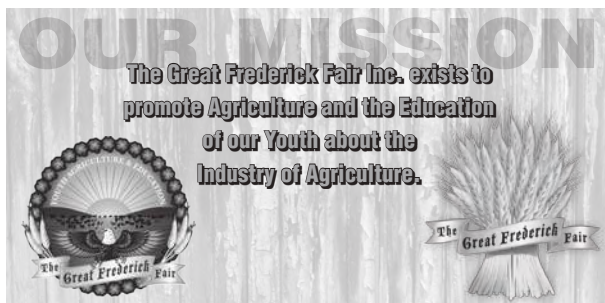

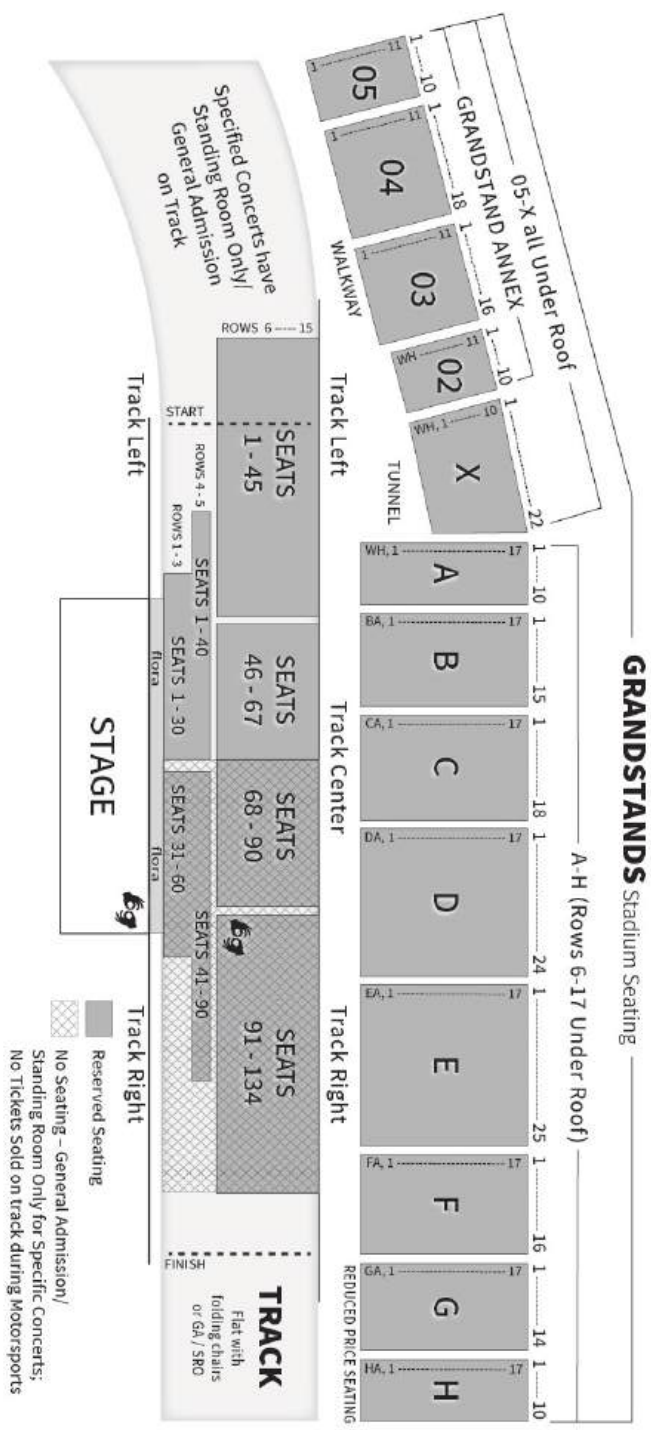

## **Agricultural Awards and Recognitions**

### **2024 Farm Family of the Year Potomac View Farm**



John and Janie Shafer, along with their son Wes, his wife Coleen, and their children Solana, Jennifer, and Frances, form the heart of Potomac View Farm, a historic dairy farm in Knoxville that has been in the Shafer family since the post-Civil War era. Over the years, the farm has grown from milking 80 registered Holsteins to 150, expanding its operations from 200 to 900 acres, with 500 owned and 400 leased. The Shafers continue to adapt and progress alongside the ever-changing agricultural landscape of Frederick County.

John and Wes manage the dairy herd, raise replacement heifers, and grow crops including corn, soybeans, wheat, barley, triticale, alfalfa, and hay. Dedicated to environmental stewardship, the Shafers work with the Frederick County Soil Conservation District to implement best management practices that enhance soil health, mitigate runoff and protect the Chesapeake Bay.

Like many dairy farmers, the Shafers have faced challenges, from unpredictable weather to volatile markets. The family also endured a profound loss when John and Janie's daughter Jennifer, a U.S. Army pilot, was tragically killed in the line of duty. Though no longer involved in the operation, she is recognized for her dedication to the farm and honored for her distinguished service to our nation.

Wes now leads Potomac View Farm as the sole owner, representing the next generation dedicated to continuing his family's legacy. In 2023, Wes purchased the home dairy farm from his parents with help from the Frederick County Critical Farms Program. Potomac View Farm has since secured a permanent land preservation



easement in the Maryland Agriculture Land Preservation Foundation (MALPF) program and is now part of Frederick County's largest contiguous tract of permanently preserved land, spanning more than 10,000 acres. Thanks to these preservation programs, Wes was also able to purchase an adjacent farm, facilitating the expansion and securing additional land for the farm's future.

Beyond farming, the Shafers are deeply rooted in their community. Jane, with 52 years of service in public education, taught math for 42 years at Brunswick and Middletown High. Wes serves as Assistant Treasurer on the Frederick County Soil Conservation District Board of Supervisors and is active in the Holstein Association and Frederick County Farm Bureau.

The Shafers innovation and commitment to excellence have earned them numerous accolades, including the Dairy of Distinction award in 2016 and recognition from the Maryland and Virginia Milk Producers for 75 years of membership in 2017.

As Potomac View Farm grows, the Shafer family remains committed to land preservation and supporting the local agricultural community. Wes, along with his wife and daughters, proudly uphold the family legacy, ensuring the farm's prosperity for future generations.

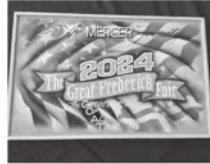

Participating or attending The Great Frederick Fair is a privilege and not a right. Exhibitors and its participants are expected to behave in a respectful and courteous manner while following the rules and regulations. Any exhibitor or its participants who engage in disruptive behavior, unlawful activity, such as intimidation, flashing signs, engaging in criminal activity and/or committing overt acts to cause disruption or incite disorder while attending The Great Frederick Fair or non-Fair events are subject to ejection, being barred from the premises, trespass notice and possible arrest at the sole discretion of the Fair.

All persons in charge of trucks and other vehicles used in the transportation of forage or refreshments must obtain admission passes from the fair's Administration Office and said trucks or vehicles must be removed from the midway before 10 a.m. each day. No person will be permitted to remain on the grounds during the night unless prior authorization.

The terms for all commercial exhibits are cash in advance. Space for commercial exhibits will be assigned by the Manager of Concessions. Commercial exhibitors must provide their own stands.

The Exhibitor or their guardian is totally responsible for the actions or inactions of a family member or participant representing the Exhibitor or any Lessor of animals leased to the Exhibitor at the Fair, but not limited thereto, if they have been found in violation of the Rules, Regulations and Provisions of the Youth Programs of The Great Frederick Fair, 4-H, FFA, the International Association of Fairs and Expositions (IAFE), the Maryland Association of Agricultural Fair and Shows (MAAFS) or any other Fairs and Shows, the Fair in its sole discretion, may bar, deny and exclude any of the aforementioned persons or animals of such persons from participating in any activities, programs and events of the Fair or any non-Fair activities located on the Fairgrounds and/or the use of the Fairgrounds for any reason, except if approval is given by the Management of the Fair or a Superintendent.

Pets are NOT permitted on the fairgrounds. The only exception is certified service animals is use by disabled persons. Animals must be PASK trained.

Persons wanting to exhibit at The Great Frederick Fair, whether for competition or not, should carefully read the following Rules and Regulations, which if strictly observed, will alleviate any concerns either to the officers of the Fair or to exhibitors. Please refer to departments for specific rules and regulations.

Youth & Open class livestock and Youth Building entries must be completed using the online entry system. All Livestock Department entries close August 15 at 11:59pm. The Youth Building, Farm & Garden, and Household building entries will close August 15 at 11:59pm.

Online registration is required for all livestock and all youth entries. Online registration is encouraged for the Household building. However, entries will also be received during specified times. Refer to departments for specific dates and times for exhibit entry and release times. Farm and Garden entries will be received in person at the designated times, online entries will only be accepted for Beer, Wine, Mead and Cider.

All entries must be made in strict compliance with the Premium List in accordance with which all premiums will be awarded. Exhibitors should, therefore, be particular to their stock or articles entered in the classes in which they properly belong.

If any exhibitor has made, or caused to be made, a false statement in regard to any animal or article entered, or if any exhibitor shall attempt to interfere with or influence any judge in the awarding of premiums, such exhibitor shall be excluded from competition, and any premium awarded shall be forfeited.

No animals or articles can be entered in more than one class, nor take more than



one premium, unless specified in the catalog. When there is no competition in a class, premiums will be given at the discretion of the judge.

An exhibitor may show any number of animals of the same age but can win only two premiums under any classification. This applies to all animals in competition.

The fair reserves the right to interpret all rules and regulations and to resolve any situation which may arise and is not restricted by the lack of or omission of a specific rule or regulation. Every attempt is made for the safe keeping and well-being of exhibits; however, the fair does not assume any liability regarding any damages to any exhibit or property.

Protests of rules, appeals from a decision of a judge, or appeals to a decision made by an oversight committee dealing with rules and regulations pertaining to the Youth shows/exhibits must be submitted in writing to the President of The Great Frederick Fair within 24 hours. All protests must be accompanied by a \$500.00 deposit, refundable if protest/ appeal is sustained; and a completed accident/incident report form, which can be obtained by a superintendent or The GFF administration office.

The Great Frederick Fair supports disciplinary policies and procedures that are in effect and imposed through proper guidelines and channels of the Youth divisions. It is also The Great Frederick Fair's policy to forfeit any and all premiums and prize winnings if for any reason exhibitor dismissal is imposed.

Space will be allocated for all dairy and livestock brought to the fair, not the number entered. There will be no refund of entry fees for animals accepted and not brought to the fairgrounds. In the event that entry numbers are too high, and barns become overcrowded, the fair has the right to turn away out of state exhibitors first, then out of county exhibitors. In this case, no deductions will be made from any premium awarded. Exhibitors: of animals must be the owners; of fruit, grain, vegetable, etc. must be the growers; of manufactured articles, the maker thereof, or a duly authorized agent. All livestock exhibitors will report to the respective superintendent's office where the superintendent of the department will assign stalls and pens. Exhibitor must see to the delivery of their department in which the same is entered.

**All premiums will be paid in the form of a check by the fair to the persons entitled to receive them.**

- **Household and Farm and Garden premium checks will NOT be mailed, only available for pick-up during entry pick-up the Sunday following Fair and at the Fair office starting the Monday following Fair.**
- **All Youth checks must be picked up from the Fair office. They will not be mailed.**
- **Open Class Livestock checks will be mailed.**

**Premium checks not cashed within 90 days of date issued will be void. Any discrepancies with premiums must be brought to the attention of the Fair Board within 30 days from date of check issuance. All exhibitors are urged to furnish correct mailing addresses at time of entering exhibits.**

**Due to the uncertainty of any premium assistance which we may receive from the Maryland Agricultural Fair Board, The Great Frederick Fair, Inc. reserves the right to adjust any and all premium offerings.**

EXHIBITOR'S PASS SYSTEM: Farm & Garden and Household exhibitors may purchase an Exhibitor Season Strip Pass for \$12. Exhibitor Season Strip Passes include one admission each day to the Fair. The rule also applies to entries of articles made by children 11 years and older. Single day \$10 admission passes may be purchased at the admission gates. Passes are not transferable and will be forfeited if presented by anyone other than the person to whom issued.

LIVESTOCK ENTRY FEES: An entry fee of \$5 per entry (dairy, goats, sheep and swine); \$15 per entry (beef); \$10 per entry (draft horse and mule); and \$30 per entry (Texas Longhorns); \$25 per open class sheep pen (max 4 head per pen); will be charged, payable when the entry is made. Entry fee DOES NOT include pen clean outs.



#### LIVESTOCK EXHIBITOR PASS POLICY:

- Non-Youth livestock families, farms and/or exhibitors (Open Class Only) will receive two (2) Exhibitor Season Passes with Parking.
- Each Youth livestock exhibitor will receive one (1) Wristband and two (2) Exhibitor Season Passes with Parking. (Any Youth exhibitor wishing to exhibit in the open class shows must pre-register and pay the appropriate entry fees stated above. This will not change the # of passes received)

\*\*\*\*Number (#) of passes allotted are the same regardless of # of entries and regardless of whether Youth ONLY or Youth AND OPEN\*\*\*\*

The Exhibitor Season Pass with Parking is good for admission onto the grounds and parking in the satellite lots B, C, or D only. (This provision does not apply to the Poultry Department). A Youth Wristband is valid for the Youth member's individual admission throughout the fair.

- One Livestock Exhibitor parking mirror permit will be issued to each farm/family regardless of the number of entries or exhibitors in the farm/family group.

Up to four (4) additional season passes may be purchased per exhibitor at \$50.

All exhibitors wishing to reserve a camper space must contact the Fair office to be added to the waiting list. The fee is \$450 per week. Camper space is limited, and spaces will be filled on a lottery system.

Poultry: An entry fee of \$1 per bird and egg entry is required, payable when entry is made. Anyone whose entry fee is less than \$12 may pay the difference to purchase a season pass.

### 2025 MARYLAND ANIMAL HEALTH FAIR AND SHOW REQUIREMENTS

The Maryland Department of Agriculture's (MDA) Animal Health Program strives to safeguard Maryland's animal industries at our fairs and shows. With an increased potential of disease transmission occurring when large numbers of animals gather for exhibition, MDA has set forth requirements for exhibitors to follow at Maryland fairs and shows. As an exhibitor, you can help reduce the potential risk of introduction and spread of infectious and/or contagious diseases by following the species-specific health requirements below.

#### **ANIMAL HEALTH ALERT HIGHLY PATHOGENIC AVIAN INFLUENZA**

**FEBRUARY 2025: DUE TO THE RECENT OUTBREAK OF HIGHLY PATHOGENIC AVIAN INFLUENZA (HPAI) IN BOTH COMMERCIAL AND BACKYARD FLOCKS IN MARYLAND, THE 2025 ANIMAL HEALTH FAIR AND SHOW REQUIREMENTS ARE AS FOLLOWS:**

**NO POULTRY EXHIBITIONS WILL BE ALLOWED PRIOR TO MAY 27, 2025.**

**A DECISION WILL BE MADE ON MAY 27, 2025 REGARDING POULTRY EXHIBITIONS FOR THE REMAINDER OF THE SHOW SEASON.**

#### **NOTABLE 2025 ANIMAL HEALTH REQUIREMENTS TO MENTION:**

1. CERTIFICATES OF VETERINARY INSPECTION (CVI):
  - a. Online CVIs have always been accepted but are encouraged and strongly recommended. Please urge the owner to print out a copy to keep with the animal(s).
2. CATTLE
  - a. Bovine Respiratory Disease Complex vaccination is RECOMMENDED for Maryland cattle, but is no longer a requirement.
3. RODEO LIVESTOCK
  - a. All rodeo livestock should follow the same requirements as those attending a fair or show.



4. POULTRY/AVIAN INFLUENZA TESTING:

- a. For avian influenza testing, **ALL BIRDS IN THE FLOCK** must test negative unless there are greater than 15 birds in the flock, then only 15 birds need to be tested. (For out-of-state flocks, if there are greater than 30 birds **IN THE FLOCK** then only 30 birds need to test negative.) "Flock" is defined as "all of the poultry on one premises, except any group of poultry that has been segregated for 21 days may be considered a separate flock" (*COMAR 15.11.11.02*)

**Maryland Law provides penalties for violations of Animal Health Law and Regulations. LIVESTOCK AND POULTRY FAILING TO MEET COMPLETE DOCUMENTATION OF ALL REQUIREMENTS WILL BE DENIED ENTRY OR REMOVED FROM THE EXHIBITION - "REJECTED." SEE ANIMAL REJECTION POLICY UNDER GENERAL REQUIREMENTS FOR EXHIBITORS.**

**REQUIREMENTS FOR SPONSORS OF A LIVESTOCK/POULTRY EXHIBITION**

(*COMAR 15.11.14.05*)

1. **Notification:** Exhibit sponsors must notify the Maryland Department of Agriculture (MDA), Animal Health Program Headquarters, 50 Harry S. Truman Parkway, Annapolis, MD 21401, of intent to sponsor an event that includes the exhibition of livestock or poultry no less than 30 days before the proposed event. Please fill out all contact information correctly, to include a phone number and email address. Animal arrival times MUST be provided to ensure coverage for entry. Please call 410.841.5810 to request an **EXHIBITION NOTIFICATION form** or go to MDA's website: <https://mda.maryland.gov/AnimalHealth/Pages/Fairs-Shows.aspx>
2. **Reporting:** Sponsors must report to MDA, within 24 hours, any animal from the exhibition suspected of having or showing obvious, apparent, or known signs of a contagious or infectious disease and/or deaths; and exclude from the exhibition premises any animals having obvious, apparent, or known signs of a contagious or infectious disease. A summary of all disease events shall be provided to MDA, in the form of an ANIMAL INCIDENT REPORT. Call 410.841.5810 to request an **ANIMAL INCIDENT REPORT FORM** or go to MDA's website: <https://mda.maryland.gov/AnimalHealth/Pages/Fairs-Shows.aspx>
3. **Records:** Exhibit sponsors must maintain a report of the owner, premises location, and species of all animals attending the exhibition and provide this report upon request to MDA.
4. **Exemptions:** Exemptions of this regulation may be granted. (Refer to *COMAR 15.11.14.05*)



## GENERAL REQUIREMENTS FOR EXHIBITORS OF ALL ANIMAL SPECIES

(COMAR 15.11.14.04-06)

- **Exhibitors** at state, county, and district fairs, along with other livestock exhibitions, expositions, rodeos, shows, and swap meets are required to comply with regulatory provisions of the State of Maryland relating to animal health as noted in COMAR 15.11.14.04-06.
  - **Requirements apply to all livestock and poultry:** Livestock is defined as those species of animals used for human food or fiber or those species of animals used for service to humans. This includes but is not limited to cattle, bison, sheep, goats, swine, equine, New World camelids (llamas & alpacas), privately owned cervids, and rabbits. Livestock does not include dogs, cats, and exotic pets. Poultry is defined as any living domestic bird raised for food or other purposes including, but not limited to, chickens, turkeys, ostriches, emus, rheas, cassowaries, other ratites, waterfowl, and game birds.
1. **DOCUMENTATION:** Documentation is required for entry of all livestock and poultry and is described below. Examples of forms can be obtained by visiting the Animal Health website at: <https://mda.maryland.gov/AnimalHealth/Pages/Fairs-Shows.aspx>
    - a. For out-of-state animals, see species specific out of state requirements. Upon request, a person who exhibits livestock or poultry shall present for inspection all reports, test results, and appropriate health certificates required to accompany their animal(s).
  2. **CERTIFICATE OF VETERINARY INSPECTION (CVI): Required for most entries.**
    - a. **MARYLAND ENTRIES:** All Maryland entries must be accompanied by a Maryland Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI) for show, except poultry, equine and rabbits.
      - i. The Maryland CVI is **valid for 120 days for Maryland fairs and shows**, providing that the status of the herd or animal(s) does not change.
      - ii. The Maryland CVI is a **legible record**, made on an official Maryland State form, issued by a Maryland and USDA Category II accredited veterinarian, issued for animals being shown within the state and not crossing a state line, which shows that the animals listed thereon meet the health requirements of the state of Maryland.
      - iii. The Maryland CVI **must be completed and signed by an accredited veterinarian (as described above)** using the properly selected report on the CVI form. Each animal must be properly identified on the CVI. The veterinarian must select if this document is for fair and exhibition season, sale or other (with explanation).
      - iv. The veterinarian is required to send the original (white and canary) copies to MDA Headquarters **within 7 days of completion**, the middle (pink) transport copy is to be retained by the owner and should accompany livestock during travel. The last (goldenrod) copy is for the veterinarian's records. Alternatively, the CVI can be completed through an online system, but it is **STRONGLY** recommended for the owner to print out a copy to keep with the animal.



- b. **OUT-OF-STATE ENTRIES:** All out-of-state entries must be accompanied by an **Interstate Certificate of Veterinary Inspection**, except poultry and rabbits.
  - i. The Interstate CVI is **valid for no more than 30 days** from the date of inspection.
  - ii. An Interstate CVI must be **legible**, made on an official form of the state of origin, issued by an accredited veterinarian (both USDA and in the state or origin), and issued for animals being imported to this state within 30 days before the entry of the animals, which shows that the animals listed thereon meet the health requirements of the state of Maryland. If this CVI is performed online, the owner is encouraged to print a copy to display at the time of entry and keep with the animal(s).
- 3. **SELF-CERTIFICATION:** A completed **Self-Certification form** is required for all entries except for equine entering equine-only events.
  - a. Self-Certification forms **must be filled out within 24 hours prior to loading** and presented upon request to the designated representative.
    - i. A Self-Certification is an official Maryland document **signed by the owner/caretaker/transporter** stating that the animals presented for exhibition are not showing any signs of or having recent exposure to infectious or contagious diseases (within 21 days).
    - ii. **Self-Certification forms** are species-specific for livestock (ruminants/swine), equine, poultry and rabbits.
    - iii. These forms are available on MDA's Animal Health website:

- 4. **TEST REPORT FORMS:** Testing is required for some species, and if so, a test report form will be required unless otherwise documented on the CVI. See species-specific requirements for details of testing and test report requirements. Examples of test reports are shown below:
  - a. Avian Influenza Test Report
  - b. Pullorum-Typhoid Test Report
  - c. Coggins Test Report (Equine Infectious Anemia)
  - d. Tuberculosis Test Report
  - e. HPAI Milk Test Report for LACTATING DAIRY cattle
- 5. **MARYLAND POULTRY PREMISES IDENTIFICATION:** All Maryland premises with poultry are required to be registered with MDA. The Poultry Premises number must be noted on the Test Report or other documentation of NPIP U.S. Pullorum-Typhoid and U.S. H5/ H7 Avian Influenza Clean or State H5/H7 Monitored status. To obtain a poultry premises number, please fill out the application available on our website:

6. **ANIMAL REJECTION POLICY:** Animals may be rejected from an exhibition, either denied entry or removed from the exhibition, as described below:
- a. **FAILURE TO PROVIDE COMPLETED DOCUMENTATION IS GROUNDS FOR REJECTION.**
  - b. Suspicion of communicable disease is adequate grounds for rejection. **Confirmed diagnosis is not required** since timely removal of suspicious animals is required by law to protect the remaining animals.
  - c. Livestock with clinical signs of infectious or contagious diseases or external parasites are not permitted entry or allowed to remain at the exhibition. Clinical signs include but are not limited to active lesions of ringworm with resulting loss of hair, sore mouth, sore nose, caseous lymphadenitis, mange, or multiple warts easily visible without close examination.
  - d. Exposed animals may be rejected if it is believed that there is a potentially serious communicable disease present. All animals originating with the suspect animal may be rejected. Vesicular diseases are of particular concern.
  - e. All decisions are final.
  - f. All parties involved will be notified of all rejections, including exhibit sponsors and supervisors.
  - g. Animal rejections can be made by MDA Animal Health veterinarians or field inspectors, private veterinarians contracted by the show, Maryland Extension employees, or individuals designated by the fair or show as a 'responsible person.'



**FAIR AND SHOW REQUIREMENTS:**  
**CATTLE**

**ALL CATTLE**

**IDENTIFICATION:** INDIVIDUAL IDENTIFICATION OF EACH ANIMAL SHALL BE AN RFID OFFICIAL EAR TAG.

*Rodeo Cattle* must have official individual ID that is recognized by the USDA (9 CFR Parts 71, 77, 78, and 86). Rodeo Cattle are NOT allowed to commingle with any other cattle at the exhibition.

**Maryland Cattle**

- **Influenza A:** No testing requirements for Maryland cattle.
- **Brucellosis:** Maryland is a Bovine Brucellosis Class-Free State. Brucellosis testing is not required for Maryland cattle.
- **Tuberculosis:** Maryland is an Accredited Tuberculosis-Free State. A tuberculin test is not required for Maryland cattle.
- **Immunization:** Bovine Respiratory Disease Complex vaccination is recommended for all cattle to include Bovine Respiratory Syncytial Virus, Bovine Viral Diarrhea Virus, Infectious Bovine Rhinotracheitis and Parainfluenza. Leptospirosis vaccination is also recommended.

**Out-of-State Cattle**

- **Influenza A:**
  - a. For LACTATING DAIRY cattle (defined as a cow that is producing milk, regardless of the volume of milk that she is producing. This does not include dairy calves, pregnant heifers, or dairy cows that are 'dry' or no longer producing milk.)
    - i. A milk sample from all four quarters must be tested for Influenza A within 7 days of travel, and results must be written on the CVI. Failure to comply will result in denied entry. A bulk tank sample will not be accepted.
- **Brucellosis:**
  - a. Bovine Brucellosis Class-Free State, Region or Zone
    - i. No brucellosis test required.
  - b. Non-Bovine Brucellosis Class-Free State, Region or Zone
    - i. Official vaccinates under 24 months old with vaccination dates recorded on the Interstate CVI permitted, or
    - ii. Test negative within 30 days before entry.
- **Tuberculosis:**
  - a. Accredited Tuberculosis-Free State, Region or Zone
    - i. No tuberculin test required.
  - b. Modified Accredited Advanced or Lower Tuberculosis Free Areas or States (Not TB Free)
    - i. All cattle over 6 months of age shall comply with the following:
      1. Cattle must originate from a herd where a complete herd test was conducted within the past 12 months; progeny from such herds born since that test may be imported without a tuberculin test, or
      2. Any individual animal, over 6 months of age, entering Maryland must have a negative tuberculin test within 60 days before import.
    - ii. Status of herd and area must be shown on their certificate.
- **Immunization:** Bovine Respiratory Disease Complex vaccination is recommended for all out of state cattle to include Bovine Respiratory Syncytial Virus, Bovine Viral Diarrhea Virus, Infectious Bovine Rhinotracheitis and Parainfluenza. Leptospirosis vaccination is also recommended.



## **FAIR AND SHOW REQUIREMENTS:**

### **SHEEP AND GOATS**

#### **ALL SHEEP**

**Identification for Sheep:** All sheep must be officially Scrapie-identified. Official identification for sheep includes the following:

1. USDA-approved Scrapie ear tags;
2. Legible registration tattoos, for which the breed registration paper shall contain the registry premises or flock tattoo prefix that is linked to the APHIS-assigned PIN and flock ID number of the flock of birth, if breed registry is approved by APHIS; or
3. Legible tattoos consisting of an individual animal number unique within the flock in one ear and the official Scrapie premises identification number (flock ID) in the other ear, except where the tail web or flank may be used for earless animals or animals with damaged ears; must be accompanied by an owner statement.
4. A microchip ID with official Scrapie identification is acceptable if the owner provides the reader.
5. USDA approved RFID tag.

#### **Out-of-State Sheep**

No additional requirements

#### **Market Lambs**

It is recommended that all lambs be slick shorn prior to entry for inspection for Club Lamb Fungus (sheep ringworm).

#### **ALL GOATS**

**Identification for Goats:** All goats must be officially Scrapie-identified. Official identification for goats includes the following:

1. USDA-approved Scrapie ear tags;
2. Legible registration tattoos, for which the breed registration paper shall contain the registry premises or flock tattoo prefix that is linked to the APHIS-assigned PIN and flock ID number of the flock of birth, if breed registry is approved by APHIS; or
3. Legible tattoos consisting of an individual animal number unique within the herd in one ear and the official Scrapie premises identification number (flock ID) in the other ear, except where the tail web or flank may be used for earless animals or animals with damaged ears; must be accompanied by an owner statement.
4. A microchip ID with official Scrapie identification is acceptable if the owner provides the reader.
5. USDA approved RFID tag.



### **Maryland Goats**

**Brucellosis:** Maryland is a Brucellosis Class-Free State. Brucellosis testing is not required for Maryland goats.

**Tuberculosis:** Maryland is an Accredited Tuberculosis-Free State. Tuberculin test is not required for Maryland goats.

### **Out-of-State Goats**

#### **Tuberculosis:**

1. Accredited Tuberculosis-Free States, Region or Zone: A tuberculin test is not required.
2. Modified Accredited Advanced or lower Tuberculosis Free Areas or States (Not TB Free)
  - a. All goats over 6 months of age shall comply with the following:
    - i. Goats must originate from herds in which all animals are tested negative within the past 12 months; progeny from such herds born since that test, may be imported without a tuberculin test, or
    - ii. Any individual animal entering Maryland must have a negative tuberculin test within 60 days before import.
  - b. Status of herd and area must be shown on their certificate.

#### **Brucellosis:**

1. There are no out of state requirements for brucellosis testing in goats.

## **FAIR AND SHOW REQUIREMENTS:**

### **SWINE**

#### **ALL SWINE**

**IDENTIFICATION:** INDIVIDUAL IDENTIFICATION OF EACH ANIMAL SHALL BE AN RFID OFFICIAL EAR TAG.

#### **Maryland Swine**

- Brucellosis: Maryland is a Brucellosis Class-Free State. Brucellosis testing is not required for Maryland swine.
- Pseudorabies: Maryland is a Pseudorabies Stage V state. Pseudorabies testing is not required for Maryland swine.
- Immunization: Leptospirosis vaccination is recommended.

#### **Out-of-State Swine**

- Brucellosis: All swine, except barrows, 6 months of age and older shall be negative on an official test for brucellosis within 30 days prior to exhibition entry, or originate directly from a validated brucellosis-free herd or brucellosis-free state.
- Pseudorabies: Swine over 6 months of age shall be negative on an official test for pseudorabies conducted within 30 days prior to exhibition entry, or originate immediately and directly from a Qualified Pseudorabies Negative herd or Stage 4 or Stage 5 Pseudorabies-Free State.
- Immunization: Leptospirosis vaccination is recommended.
- All U.S. states are currently swine brucellosis free and pseudorabies free (this is the current status as of February 2025 but please continue to regularly check each state's status for any changes).



**FAIR AND SHOW REQUIREMENTS:**  
**HORSES, PONIES, MULES, AND OTHER EQUIDAE**

**ALL EQUINE**

- **Identification:** Individual official identification shall include the following as applicable: Equine Infectious Anemia (EIA) test report with photo or drawing of the animal, tattoo, brand, or microchip. Animals using tattoos or brands for official identification must be accompanied by the breed registration papers.
- **Equine Infectious Anemia (Coggins) Testing:** All equine for exhibition shall be accompanied by a valid Coggins Test done within 12 months prior to exhibition entry.
- **Self-Certification Requirement and Exemption:** Exhibitor's Self Certification of Animal Health is required for each equine entering a fair/show-type event where multiple livestock species are present. The form must be available for inspection if requested. Those participating in equine-only shows and events are exempt from this requirement; however, it is good practice to thoroughly double check the health and skin condition of the animal before departing for the event. The form provides an easy checklist to do this. Exhibitors may not bring an animal having apparent or known signs of a contagious or infectious disease to a show.

**Maryland Equine**

1. All horses and other equidae, 9 months of age and older, shall be accompanied by a negative test for Equine Infectious Anemia (EIA) within the 12 months before the date of the event. A copy of this test shall accompany every animal.
2. A Maryland CVI is not required for Maryland equine.

**Out-of-State Equine**

1. All horses and other equidae, 9 months of age and older, shall be accompanied by a negative test for Equine Infectious Anemia (EIA) within the 12 months before the date of the event. A copy of this test shall accompany every animal.
2. All horses and other equidae shall be accompanied by a CVI issued within 30 days prior to entry. An Interstate CVI must be legible, made on an official form from the state of origin, issued by an accredited veterinarian, and issued for animals being imported to this state within 30 days before the entry of the animals, which shows that the animals listed thereon meet the health requirements of the state of Maryland.
  - a. The following contiguous states and New Jersey are exempted from the CVI requirement: Delaware, Pennsylvania, Virginia, and West Virginia.



**FAIR AND SHOW REQUIREMENTS:**  
**RABBITS**

**ALL RABBITS**

1. Rabbits are not required to have a Certificate of Veterinary Inspection.
2. **Identification:** Individual identification of each animal shall be a tag, tattoo, or microchip, if the exhibitor provides the reader.
3. All rabbit exhibitors shall complete a Rabbit Exhibitor's Self Certification of Animal Health.

*No additional requirements for out of state rabbits.*

**FAIR AND SHOW REQUIREMENTS:**  
**CAMELIDS**

**ALL CAMELIDS**

**Identification:** Individual identification of each animal shall be an official metal ear tag or microchip, if the exhibitor provides the reader.

**Maryland Camelids**

**Brucellosis:** Brucellosis testing is not required for Maryland camelids.

**Tuberculosis:** Tuberculin test is not required for Maryland camelids.

**Out-Of-State Camelids**

- **Brucellosis:** Brucellosis testing is not required for out-of-state camelids.
- **Tuberculosis:**
  1. Accredited Tuberculosis-Free State, Region or Zone
    - a. No tuberculin test required.
  2. Modified Accredited Advanced or lower Tuberculosis Free Areas or States (Not TB Free)
    - a. All camelids over 6 months of age shall comply with the following:
      - i. Camelids must originate from a herd not under restriction or quarantine for tuberculosis and from which a complete herd test was conducted within the past 12 months; progeny from such herds born since that test may be imported without a tuberculin test, or
      - ii. Any individual animal, over 6 months of age, entering Maryland must have a negative tuberculin test within 60 days before import.
    - b. Status of herd and area must be shown on their certificate.



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## **Bullying and Harassment Policy among exhibitors**

### ***Adopted: 2017***

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Everyone has the right to feel respected and be treated with dignity. The Great Frederick Fair encourages that exhibitors are to act in a courteous, honest manner, to provide an optimal competitive environment for achievement and be free from verbal assault, violence, and harassment.

This includes both in the exhibit area and the show ring.

Superintendents establish clear behavior standards and make every effort to be aware of problems, provide proper guidance and supervision and consistently and fairly enforce policies. If a mutual agreement cannot take place, then a letter must be sent with the superintendent or directly sent to the Fair Office.

Bullying incidents, however, usually tend to occur out of sight of fair-going public. While poor sportsmanship may also be interpreted as bullying or harassment, care should be taken, and clear narratives of any incident should be documented. A comprehensive approach that includes youth, youth leaders, parents, superintendents, show staff, and exhibitors has the most promise in reducing bullying. It is not helpful to simply tell a person to ignore bullying or encourage a person to fight the bully. It is important to report bullying because it may not stop without help.

**First Offense** - Letter of Reprimand

**Second Offense** - Dismissal from Fairgrounds

**Third Offense** - Permanent dismissal from Fairgrounds



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## **IAFE National Code of Show Ring Ethics**

### ***Adopted by the Board of Directors, The Great Frederick Fair (Modified for GFF)***

Exhibitors of animals at livestock shows shall at all times deport themselves with honesty and good sportsmanship. Their conduct in this competitive environment shall always reflect the highest standards of honor and dignity to promote the advancement of agriculture education. This code applies to junior as well as open class exhibitors who compete in structured classes of competition. This code applies to all livestock offered in any event at a livestock show. In addition to the "IAFE National Code of Show Ring Ethics," fairs and livestock shows may have rules and regulations which they impose on the local, county, state, provincial and national levels.

All youth leaders working with junior exhibitors are under an affirmative responsibility to do more than avoid improper conduct or questionable acts. Their moral values must be so certain and positive that those younger and more pliable will be influenced by their fine example. Owners, exhibitors, fitters, trainers, and absolutely responsible persons who violate the code of ethics will forfeit premiums, awards and auction proceeds and shall be prohibited from future exhibition in accordance with rules adopted by



respective fairs and livestock shows. Exhibitors who violate this code of ethics demean the integrity of all livestock exhibitors and should be prohibited from competition at all livestock shows in the United States and Canada.

Protests of rules, appeals from a decision of a judge, or appeals to a decision made by an oversight committee dealing with rules and regulations pertaining to the Youth (4-H/FFA/GFF) Shows/Exhibits must be submitted in writing to the President of The Great Frederick Fair within 24 hours. All protests must be accompanied by a \$100.00 deposit, refundable if protest/appeal is sustained; and a completed accident/incident report form, which can be obtained from the Fair office or a GFF superintendent. The Great Frederick Fair supports disciplinary policies and procedures that are in effect and imposed through proper guidelines and channels. The Great Frederick Fair requires all exhibitors to agree and consent to abide by the rules of competition, including the IAFE National Code of Show Ring Ethics, and the GFF Bullying & Harassment Policy. It is also The Great Frederick Fair's policy to forfeit any and all premiums and prize winnings if for any reason exhibitor dismissal is imposed.

The following is a list of guidelines for all exhibitors and all livestock in competitive events:

1. All exhibitors must present, upon request of fair and livestock show officials, proof of ownership, length of ownership and age of all animals entered. Misrepresentation of ownership, age, or any facts relating thereto is prohibited.
2. Owners, exhibitors, fitter, trainers, or absolutely responsible persons shall provide animal health certificates from licensed veterinarians upon request by fair or livestock show officials.
3. Junior exhibitors are expected to care for and groom their animals while at fairs or livestock shows.
4. Animals shall be presented to show events where they will enter the food chain free of violative drug residues. The act of entering an animal in a livestock show is the giving of consent by the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer and/or absolutely responsible person for show management to obtain any specimens of urine, saliva, blood, or other substances from the animals to be used in testing. Animals not entered in an event which culminates with the animal entering the food chain shall not be administered drugs other than in accordance with applicable federal, state, and provincial statutes, regulations, and rules. Livestock shall not be exhibited if drugs administered in accordance with federal, state, and provincial statutes, regulations and rules affect the animal's performance or appearance at the event. If the laboratory report on the analysis of saliva, urine, blood, or other sample taken from livestock indicates the presence of forbidden drugs or medication, this shall be prima facie evidence such substance has been administered to the animal either internally or externally. It is presumed that the sample of urine, saliva, blood, or other substance tested by the laboratory to which it is sent is the one taken from the animal in question, its integrity is preserved and all procedures of said collection and preservation transfer to the laboratory and analysis of the sample are correct and accurate and the report received from the laboratory pertains to the sample taken from the animal in question and correctly reflects the condition of the animal at the time the sample was taken, with the burden of the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or absolutely responsible person to prove



otherwise. At any time after an animal arrives on the fair or livestock show premises, all treatments involving the use of drugs and/or medications for the sole purpose of protecting the health of the animal shall be administered by a licensed veterinarian.

5. Any surgical procedure or injection of any foreign substance or drug or the external application of any substance (irritant, counterirritant, or similar substance) which could affect the animal's performance or alter its natural contour, conformation, or appearance except external applications of substance to the hoofs or horns of animals which affect appearance only and except for surgical procedures performed by a duly licensed veterinarian for the sole purpose of protecting the health of the animal, is prohibited.
6. The use of showing and/or handling practices or devices such as striking animals to cause swelling, using electrical contrivance, or other similar practices are not acceptable and are prohibited.
7. Direct criticism or interference with the judge, fair or livestock show management, other exhibitors, breed representatives, or show officials before, during, or after the competitive event is prohibited. In the furtherance of their official duty, all judges, fair and livestock show management, or other show officials shall be treated with courtesy, cooperation and respect and no person shall direct abusive or threatening conduct toward them.
8. No owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or absolutely responsible person shall conspire with another person or persons to intentionally violate this code of ethics or knowingly contribute or cooperate with another person or persons either by affirmative action or inaction to violate this code of ethics. Violation of this rule shall subject such individual to disciplinary action.
9. The application of this code of ethics provides for absolute responsibility for an animal's condition by owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or participant whether or not he or she was actually instrumental in or had actual knowledge of the treatment of the animal in contravention of this code of ethics.
10. The act of entering an animal is the giving of consent by the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or absolutely responsible person to have disciplinary action taken by the fair or livestock show for violation of this Code of Show Ring Ethics and any other rules of competition of the fair or livestock show without recourse against the fair or livestock show. The act of entering an animal is the giving of consent that any proceedings or disciplinary action taken by the fair or livestock show may be published with the name of the violator or violators in any publication of the International Association of Fairs and Expositions, including Fairs and Expositions and any special notices to members.
11. The act of entering of an animal in a fair or livestock show is the giving of verification by the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer or absolutely responsible person that he or she has read the IAFE National Code of Show Ring Ethics and understands the consequences of and penalties provided for actions prohibited by the code. It is further a consent that any action which contravenes these rules and is also in violation of federal, state, or provincial statutes, regulations, or rules may be released to appropriate law enforcement authorities with jurisdiction over such infractions.



## JUDGES:

The object being to secure awards as free as possible from "fear, favor, or affection," the judges will allow no person to interfere or converse with them during their adjudication, except the superintendent of their department. Judges will be permitted to see the books of entry to ascertain the names of animals and their owners, after they have made their decision, in order to insert the same in their report.

Blank reports will be furnished to the judges by the fair, with the number of premiums offered. On these, the judges will make their awards in writing, sign the same and hand to the superintendent, who will immediately deliver the same to the Fair.

Judges will be careful to award premiums only to such animals or articles for which a premium or recognition is offered by the Fair.

The judges will, in all cases, whether there be competition or not, award only such premiums as they deem proper as the merit of the animal or article warrants.

No person shall act as judge upon any animal or article in which he or she may be interested as exhibitor, the agent or employee of an exhibitor or otherwise, and no award shall be valid or will be paid in any case where it shall be proven that any judge is, or was at that time interested as exhibitor, owner or otherwise, in any articles or animals awarded premiums.

The judges of animals will have to regard the symmetry, early maturity, size, and general qualities characteristic of the breeds which they judge. They may make do allowance for age, feeding, and other circumstances, and the character and condition of the animals. They will not award premiums for bulls, cows, or heifers which seem to have been fattened for processing: the object being to have superior animals for breeding.

All animals or articles competing for the same premium must be brought together as the judges may appoint. The judges may require, at their discretion, exhibitors to change the position, and bring in proximity animals and articles concerning the comparative merits of which they may feel in doubt.

Premium ribbons and cards will be attached to animals or articles as soon as the awards are made by the judges, thus: blue to indicate first; red for second; white for third; yellow for fourth; green for fifth.



## Care & Schedule of Exhibits

All proper care will be taken of animals by the exhibitors and articles on exhibition, but the fair will not be responsible for loss or damage by fire, accident, or irregular entry. Refer to individual departments for release times. The Farm & Garden and Household Building exhibits and premium checks will be released from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. on the Sunday following the Fair. No prize money will be paid on animals or articles removed in violation of this rule. Ribbons and exhibits not picked up within one week will be discarded.

## Rules & Regulations

1. Show times are subject to change based on breed entries.
2. The dairy cattle show is open to all, irrespective of residence.
3. An entry fee of \$5 is required for each entry, payable when entry is made. Refer to Rules/Regulations for pass policies.
4. No entry fee deductions will be made from any premiums awarded.
5. The Registration Certificate – which will be considered as proof of identity, parentage, birth date, ownership, and breeder of an animal, must be available upon request to the Cattle Superintendent or any person designated by Show Management during the show. All animals must be registered in their respective herd books.

**Ayrshire** – Ayrshire Genetic Recover animals which are registered in the GR stage may also be shown. The registration certificate will state “Grade Ayrshire – Genetic Recovery. Dual registered animals must show in the same breed shows if the animal is to be shown in the respective youth and open show.

**Brown Swiss** – Standard Registration from which is white with the green border is issued with a normal six-digit Registration Number for Registered Brown Swiss Females and Certified Identity Enrollment Female (CIE). Brown Swiss step II E Identity Enrollment animals which have a 379 plus six-digit registration number may also be shown. Registration paper is green with black border.

**Guernsey** – Registered Guernsey females and females in step four of the Genetic Recover Program are eligible to show. Step four females have a “GR” prefix in their name. No other prefixes are eligible. Dual registered animals must show in the same breed shows if the animal is to be shown in the respective youth and open show.

**Holstein** – Holsteins with the 87 percent Registered Holstein Ancestry (RHA) and above are eligible to show. Dual registered animals must show in the same breed shows if the animal is to be shown in the respective youth and open show.

**Jersey** – Registered Jersey females and females in the step three of the Genetic Recover Program are eligible to show. Step three animals are designated as “GR”, “J1”, “OA”, and “PR” animals are not eligible to show.

**Milking Shorthorn** – Cattle must have full herd book six-digit Milking Shorthorn Registry Certificates. Tattoo numbers must correspond with the registry certificate. Milking Shorthorn females with the nine-digit Birth Record Certificates, (begins with 36000 or 37000), are not eligible to show. Any Milking Shorthorn with black hair cannot be shown. Dual registered animals must show in the same breed shows if the animal is to be shown in the respective youth and open show. All show entries must comply with the eligibility regulations of the breeds national show policy. The Dairy Superintendent and staff will use all reasonable diligence to prevent errors or improper substitutions of animals. All entries must be checked and identified with a registration certificate by a Dairy Superintendent/Show Manager prior to showing. Any animal which cannot be identified by means of color markings or ear tattoo will be disqualified. Management invites the cooperation of Breed Registry Organization personnel and exhibitors in preventing errors in entering or in the showing of animals.

6. Animals must compete in individual classes to be shown in group classes.  
**Group Entries** – Entries not included on original entry form must be made no later than 1 p.m. of the day prior to the show. Group Cards designating animals must be completed by exhibitor and handed to show management prior to entrance in ring.



**Entries will not be accepted once the breed show has begun.**

7. Any changes in entries must be made at check-in time. Substitutions may be made within the same breed. No added entries will be accepted.
8. Exhibitors are allowed two entries for individual classes. All group classes limited to one entry per exhibitor.
9. All champions, both juniors and seniors of each breed, must remain on fairgrounds for the entire week.
10. All trailers must be parked in Lot E as designated by fair officials.
11. **An exhibitors' meeting will be held at 7 p.m. Tuesday, September 2, 2025, at Building 32, South Mt. Creamery Large Arena.**
12. Parent/Guardian will be and are responsible for conduct of minor children.
13. Exhibitors are to present a copy of Approved Animal Health Papers to their Superintendent upon check-in. All animals exhibited must be listed on approved health papers. Original approved health papers will still be required by exhibitors to have upon arrival and until such time as reviewed by fair officials and or the Maryland Department of Agriculture (MDA) Inspectors.
14. In the show ring competition, the decision of the judge is final in all cases, except where an error or misrepresentation is discovered after the placings have been announced, but before the end of the show. In such cases, the final decision will be made by Department Superintendent.
15. Anyone not wearing closed toe shoes will not be permitted to enter the milking parlor. (Crocs, clogs, sandals, flip flops, etc. are not permitted.)
16. Dress Code for Open Classes: White pants and a colored or patterned shirt without any printing/advertising including farm names, no hats, no sunglasses.
17. No Children under the age of 6 will be permitted in the show ring during the open class shows even if accompanied by an adult. Other children ages 6-8 may be asked to leave the show ring at the discretion of the Superintendent(s) if a safety concern is identified.
18. TV's are not permitted in the barns.
19. All exhibitors MUST clean out all bedding into the center aisle of the barns. Exhibitors that do not comply will forfeit premium checks.
20. Refer to general rules and regulations for additional information.

**Ownership**

**Exhibitor** – An exhibitor must be the owner or member of a partnership owning the animal. To be eligible for competition, whether singly or in groups, animals must be the bona fide property of exhibitors, except where otherwise specified. Certificate of Registration showing ownership must be available for checking by the Superintendent or any person designated by Show Management prior to the day of showing. In classes for Daughter-Dam and Produce-of-Dam, animals need not be owned by exhibitors.

**Animals owned in Partnership** – (each partner being named on the Registration Certificate), may be entered in any class of the show under one owner's name throughout the show. Each unique partnership requires a separate entry form. However, for an animal owned by more than one person, (any partnership), to qualify under the "Family Unit", all owners must be bona fide members of the "Family Unit". Animals owned by a syndicate, firm, or farm must be entered and shown exactly as listed on the registration certificate.

**Family Unit** – If a herd is registered in the names of the immediate members of a family (Member) of the farm owner (Major Exhibitor), these persons must enter the



show as individual exhibitors and they may combine their entries and be considered one exhibitor. All animals must be (A.) Under the exclusive care and management of the herd owner, and (B.) Housed, health tested, and production tested with the owner’s herd. In order to qualify as a “Family Unit” under this rule, all animals must be tested under one ownership or as one farm unit. Once the “Family Unit” option is adopted, all animals entered from the farm must be shown under the “Family Unit”. The Major Exhibitor must own one or more animals in the Herd Unit. However, each individual owner must submit a separate entry blank. A list of names of all individuals owning animals included in the “Family Unit” and the names of the “Family Unit” must be submitted with the application for entry and will be considered as one exhibitor throughout the show. If the “Family Unit” option is elected, any animal owned by any person in the group may be substituted for one owned by any other person in the group according to substitution rule #7. Partnership or Syndicate owned animals do not qualify under the Family Unit Rule. They must enter separately.

Herds must consist of two or more animals. Any display should follow the theme of the Fair. There are no other class of livestock exhibits that requires such great attention to cleanliness, neatness and sanitation as does the exhibit of cattle. Realizing that the herdsman is directly responsible for the condition of the herd and the area it occupies, the Herdsman Contest should not only be an incentive to the herdsman but should also add greatly to the general appearance of the barns.

The Herdsman Awards will be presented at 7:30 a.m.  
 Saturday, September 20, during the Dairy Exhibitors Awards Ceremony.

The Youth Dairy Barn Awards will be combined with the Open Class and be called Herdsman Awards. The Youth and Open Class Superintendents will appoint a committee to make inspections during the week to determine their judgement, using the following points system:

**The Purebred Dairy Cattle Association Show Ring Code of Ethics**

Adopted May 5, 2015

The showing of registered dairy cattle stimulates and sustains interest in the breeding of registered dairy cattle. It is also an important part of the promotion, merchandising and breeding program of many breeders.

For these reasons, the Purebred Dairy Cattle Association (PDCA) believes that it is in the best interest of all breeders of registered dairy cattle to maintain a reputation of integrity in dairy cattle shows and to present a wholesome and progressive image of dairy cattle in the show ring.

PDCA endorses this Show Ring Code of Ethics for all dairy breed shows and pledges its full cooperative support for its enforcement to show management, show judges, and the national breed associations.

The application of this Code of Ethics provides for absolute responsibility for an animal's condition by an owner, exhibitor, fitter or participant whether or not he or she was actually instrumental in or had actual knowledge of the treatment of the animal in contravention of this Code of Ethics. Dairy cattle exhibitors shall, at all times, deport themselves with honesty and good sportsmanship.

It is recognized that there are certain practices in the proper care and management of dairy cattle that are necessary in the course of moving dairy cattle to and between shows that are advisable to keep them in a sound, healthy state so they might be presented in the show ring in a natural, normal condition. At all times, exhibition livestock shall be treated in a humane manner and in accordance with dairy quality assurance practices so as to protect the health, safety and welfare of the livestock and the consuming public. No person shall present for exhibition or exhibit an animal which he or she knows, or has reason to suspect, is affected with or has been exposed to a dangerously contagious or infectious disease, or illegal or non-approved use of drugs, medication and/or prohibited substance, or residue.

The position of the Purebred Dairy Cattle Association is that all animals presented for exhibition shall be in their natural conformation and structure, free of any alteration or modification by injection or internal or external administration of any substance or by any involvement in unethical fitting.



## **Grooming and Preparation -**

Dairy cattle exhibitions are conducted under standards for evaluating conformation established by the PDCA Unified Score Card (2009), with specific breed characteristics taken into consideration by the show judge.

In this connection, animals will be groomed and prepared for the judge's evaluation in order to display the animal's natural contour, conformation, performance, and mobility. Specifically:

1. Changing the natural color of the animal is prohibited (effective 6/1/2015). However, external applications of cosmetics that affect only appearance may be used, including by way of example hoof polishes and false switches.
2. The maximum allowable length of naturally growing hair anywhere on the topline is not to exceed 1". Exhibitors will be required to comply with this rule before the animal is allowed to enter the ring.
3. Addition of foreign objects, including but not limited to hair or hair substitutes, cloth, or fiber, to change the natural contour or appearance of the animal's body is prohibited.
4. Externally sealing the teat end with a preparation that does not harm the animal's skin is permissible. Natural teat placement will be given preference over artificially positioned teats.

## **Violations: False, Deceptive or Unacceptable Practices**

These practices are violations of the Code of Ethics and will be reported to show management and may be reported to the respective National Breed Associations:

1. Misrepresenting the age and/or milking status of the animal for the class in which it is shown.
2. Treating the animal, particularly the udder, internally or externally:
  - a. With an irritant or counterirritant,
  - b. Using a device to artificially create or enhance the udder crease,
  - c. Using other substances as detected by testing that causes changes in the udder to artificially improve the conformation,
  - d. Plugging of teat canal with foreign substances.
3. Surgical or unethical insertion of any matter under the skin or into body cavities, performed to change the natural contour or appearance of the animal's body (e.g., administration of fluid via a stomach tube or other similar apparatus to fill the rumen), though not to preclude practices required or involved in normal management.
4. Criticizing or interfering with the judge, show management or other exhibitors while in the show ring or other conduct detrimental to the breed or the show.
5. Challenging, threatening, or interfering with an ethics committee appointed by show management to monitor the animals on exhibit on the show grounds.

## **Exhibitor Responsibility**

The act of entering an animal in a livestock show is the giving of consent by the owner, exhibitor, fitter, and/or absolutely responsible person (hereinafter referred to as "Exhibitor") for show management to obtain any specimens of urine, saliva, blood, milk, or other substances from the animal to be used in testing. Materials may also be collected by ultrasound and photographic methods and by direct examination of animal. The act of entering an animal is the giving of consent by the owner, exhibitor, fitter and/or absolutely responsible person (the "Exhibitor") to have disciplinary action for violation of this Show Ring Code of Ethics taken by Show Management, the State in which the show occurs, and/or the National Dairy Breed Association without recourse.



## **Show Ethics Committee**

Each show should have an Ethics Committee. The make-up of this committee should include Official Breed Representatives, Representative(s) of Show Management (e.g., Dairy Cattle Show Superintendent, General Manager), the Official Show Veterinarian, and Extension Representative.

The Ethics Committee will be responsible for monitoring violations of the Show Ring Code of Ethics. The Ethics Committee will investigate the report of any violation and determine the accuracy of the allegation. The Ethics Committee will have the authority to inspect animals and related material to determine if violations have occurred.

### **Violations: Reporting and Investigation**

Complaints of alleged violations can be reported to the Breed Superintendent, the Show Superintendent, Show Management, and/or the Ethics Committee.

#### **1. Before an Animal is Shown**

If the Ethics Committee suspects that a violation of the Show Ring Code of Ethics will occur if the animal is shown, and that violation is reasonably well established before the animal is shown, the Ethics Committee will submit a report to show management.

Show Management will discuss the violation with the Exhibitor:

- a. If, at the Exhibitor's discretion, the animal in question is not shown, no violation will have occurred.
- b. If the Exhibitor wishes to challenge that a violation occurred, he/she/they will have opportunity to appeal to the Ethics Committee. If its decision is not changed, the Exhibitor will be denied opportunity to exhibit the animal in question.

#### **2. During and After an Animal is Shown**

All animals are subject to examination during judging. The judge and Ethics Committee are instructed to examine the top five (5) animals in each class closely for violations of the Show Ring Code of Ethics. When a violation may have occurred, a milk-out may be called for. This call may be by Breed Association rule, or by request of an authorized representative of the National Breed Association, the Judge, the Ethics Committee, or Show Management.

If an animal is exhibited and a violation of the Show Ring Code of Ethics is subsequently suspected, investigated, and determined to have occurred, the violation will be reported to the Ethics Committee and Show Management for action. The Exhibitor will be notified of the violation and supporting evidence and will be invited to defend or explain the allegations.

Violations are subject to the disciplinary provisions of show management, the state in which the show occurs, and the national dairy breed association.

Sanctions may include any one or combination of the following:

- forfeiture or return of awards, prizes, premiums, or proceeds
- written letter of reprimand to the owner, exhibitor, fitter and /or responsible person (the "Exhibitor")
- disqualification of the exhibition livestock from an exhibition
- disqualification of the Exhibitor from the show
- publication of offense.

Disqualification may include any or all shows and classes and may be for any number of years.

### **Rules & Regulations:**

1. The beef cattle show is open to all, irrespective of residence.
2. An entry fee of \$15 is required for each entry which includes the cost of mulch. Entry fees are payable when entries are made. Entry fees of \$30 is required for each animal in the Texas Longhorn Show. Refer to rules & regulations for pass policies.
3. No entry fee deductions will be made from any premiums awarded.
4. Refer to all general rules on page 31 for additional regulations.
5. All animals must be registered in the recognized herd books of the respective breeds. If your breed is not listed, please enter All Other Breeds (AOB).
  - a. Any breeds with less than 6 animals (2 different exhibitors) will be switched to the AOB Division.
  - b. Regardless of the breed divisions listed above, the Beef Committee has full discretion to modify/change/switch animals between breed divisions based on entry numbers.
6. All registration information **MUST** be completed for all entries.
7. Any animal that is "dual" registered in both the beef and dairy breed books may be shown as either beef or dairy, but not both.
8. Breed declaration for multi-registered animals must occur by check-in. The animal must keep the same designation for the same breed in both the youth and open shows.
9. Senior Yearlings are eligible to be shown with natural calf at side but are not eligible



to be shown as cow/calf pair.

10. Feeder calf classes are for heifers and steers only. Registered heifers shown as a feeder calf are considered terminal, therefore may not be shown in a breed class also.
11. Only animals competing as individuals are eligible to compete in group classes
12. All animals must have a scannable electronic RFID tag to be eligible to show, NO exceptions (this includes all prospect cattle). No EIDS will be available for exhibitors onsite.
13. All registered cattle MUST have Tattoos and EIDS. All cattle that are checked in without a tattoo in the ear matching the registration paper, will automatically be disqualified.
  - a. Exhibitors must present a hard copy of the registration paper at the time of check-in. Electronic versions will not be accepted.
14. Adhesives may be used, however, any product used to alter the conformation and/or appearance of the animal for exhibition is prohibited.
15. No false hair, twinning or artificial fill is allowed (including pumping and drenching unless deemed medically necessary and performed by a Vet). Animals found in violation will be disqualified.
16. Butt fans are not permitted inside the barns, fans should be hung and allowed 2 animals per fan. No generators permitted inside the barns.
17. No chutes are permitted in the walkways of the barn. Chutes may be used in a pen area if space permits.

### **Additional Rules & Regulations:**

1. A calf shown with a cow shall not be older than 210 days of age. A calf shall be at least 180 days of age to show in individual classes. Calf at side may show only in one class as calf at side with dam or in individual class.
2. Exhibitors are expressly prohibited from altering the physical appearance or features of any animal, with the exception of the trimming of the prepuce hair of bulls and hoof trimming. Exhibitors are encouraged to bathe and brush their cattle and present them in a neat and professional manner. Any animal found by the Show Chairman to be physically altered will be removed from the show.
3. Cattle cannot show both haltered and non-halterd in the same age group within a single show.
4. Any protest, dispute of a final interpretation or any incident occurring during the course of a show should be brought to the attention of the International Show committee. Final decisions regarding protests will be expressly and exclusively reserved to the International Show Committee. By Signing the required entry form, exhibitors give unqualified consent and agreement to abide by all printed rules.
5. While exhibiting cattle in the show ring, exhibitors will wear western attire appropriate for the climate. No ball caps or tennis shoes and no written advertising on clothing will be permitted. Exhibitors shall conduct themselves in a professional manner in the show ring. Class numbers shall be worn on the left side.



6. Calves shown at the side in the haltered show must be on halter and led by an exhibitor. Animals must be kept under control at all times. Should an animal become unmanageable, the judge has the right and responsibility to remove such animals from competition and all entry fees will be forfeited.
7. Females over 30 months old must be shown with calf at side or be palpated safe in calf by a veterinarian with notation made on the health certificate.
8. No crossbred calves may be shown at side of cows.
9. Any exhibitors who remove their animals from the Fairgrounds prior to the designated release time will forfeit all premiums.

2. Anyone whose entry fee is less than \$12 may purchase a Season Pass for an additional \$12.
3. There will be no farm flocks, and no classes for trios.
4. Premiums will be awarded to all variety of poultry recognized in the Standard of Perfection; and ornamental varieties as well as non-standard breeds and varieties recognized distinctly as such by the superintendent.
5. Poultry exhibitors must comply with the Maryland Department of Agriculture Health Requirements for Poultry. Please refer to the Rules and Regulations section of the Fair book.
6. During Exhibition, all specimens will be under the control of the superintendent and cannot be removed without authorization. A poultry technician will be on hand to make a daily inspection of all birds on exhibition; any bird showing signs of sickness or disease will be removed from the poultry building.
7. Protests must be made in writing. Please refer to the Rules and Regulations section of the Fair book.
8. The term "specimen" implies anything for which a premium is offered. The cock and hen are specimens hatched prior to 2025; Cockerel and Pullet are specimens hatched during 2025.
9. Any exhibitor interfering with a judge while discharging his duties or interfering with or handling any specimen or exhibition other than his own shall forfeit all



premiums that may have been awarded.

10. Any exhibits left in the building after 9 a.m., Sunday, Sept. 21 will be done so at the owners' risk.
11. Exhibitors are limited to two entries per class per variety.
12. Specimens will be fed and cared for at the expense of the fair.
13. The same type of egg may not be entered in more than one class. Eggs must come from the exhibitors own flock.
14. Exhibitors are responsible for picking up ribbons from egg entries. Ribbons will not be held or mailed after entry release times on Sunday.
15. Refer to general rules and regulations for additional information.
16. Crossbreed laying breeds are not to be entered. Crossbreeds will be sent home and are not allowed to be housed in the poultry barn.

### **Rules & Regulations:**

1. Refer to rules and regulations of general Fair for pass policy.
2. Entries close August 15. **No late entries will be accepted.**
3. Judges' decisions are final.
4. All horses and mules nine months or older must have proof of negative EAI/Coggins test within 12 months of the show date (i.e. – dated after September 15, 2024) Copy **MUST Accompany entry form.**
5. **As per Federal Law, All out of state livestock including horses and mules must have a CVI no more than 30 days prior (dated after 8/15/25) or a Global Vetlink Passport no more than 120 days prior (dated after 5/18/25) in order to participate.**
6. All animals exhibited in divisions 1-23, (classes 1 -75) must be registered with the appropriate breed association. You **MUST** send a copy of the registration papers with your entries, including Drum Horse Geldings with breed associations. Youth ages are determined by their age as of January 1, 2025.
7. Youth exhibitors 18 years, as of January 1 of current year may waive youth status and show as adults in hitch/cart classes and are not eligible for any youth classes.
8. Pee-Wee showmanship, class 107, must be accompanied by an experienced adult at all times when in the ring. Pee-Wee exhibitors must wear protective head gear.
9. Youth driving in classes 125, 126, 134 & 135 must be accompanied by an experienced adult driver.
10. Youth **MAY NOT** show, ride or drive Stallions. Exception: 2025 Stallion Foals and Mare & Foal classes.
11. Youth and Pee-Wee exhibitors must wear riding helmets in Under Saddle Classes.
12. Any stallion not being shown under control will be excused from the ring and will have to be housed on the trailer or removed from the Fairgrounds.
13. Senior showmanship is for exhibitors 65 years & older. The limited Mobility Showmanship class is for adults with restricted mobility. Showman will be asked to **WALK ONLY** with their horse/mule. Showman **CANNOT** show in both classes and are **NOT** allowed to



show in any other Halter classes (Mare, Mare & Foal, Stallion, Gelding or Mule).

14. The show committee reserves the right to divide, combine or cancel classes as numbers of entries warrant. The show committee reserves the right to refuse any entry.
15. The Great Frederick Fair, Inc. will not be responsible for accidents, damage, injury, or illness of the animals, owners, drivers, employees, attendants, spectators, or any other person or property in connection with The Great Frederick Fair Draft Horse and Mule Show.
16. Rules of courtesy must be obeyed at all times. Any act of discourtesy to judges or show officials on the part of owner, exhibitor, or groom will disqualify that entry and all entry fees and premiums will be forfeited.
17. Animals not in show condition or showing any lameness will be disqualified. All vehicles and harness must be in safe, useable condition.
18. Any owner, exhibitor or groom mistreating an animal will be barred from the show and all entry fees and premiums forfeited.
19. All use of alcohol or drugs is strictly forbidden. Anyone found using these substances before, during, or after the show will forfeit all premiums and will be removed from the Fairgrounds.
20. Dogs are not permitted on the grounds.

**Dress Codes:** The dress codes apply to all Draft Horse and Mule exhibitors includes driver and show ring assistants to the exhibitor.

**Halter classes:** Dress slacks, shirt or blouse, tie, and hat optional. No blue, faded or torn jeans. Proper footwear required. No T-shirts.

5. Fleeces should be clean, free of chaff, burrs, tags, second cuts and cotting. All fleece must be skirted.
6. Fleeces must be cut side out and tagged with breed, sex and number of months growth.
7. Place entire fleece in a clear unmarked plastic bag that can easily be opened. Do not tie shut.
8. A producer is eligible for no more than 2 money awards in any one class.
9. All fleeces will be judged to breed standards. Fleeces may be moved to a different class if the judge deems necessary.
10. All fleeces will be judged on 50% breed standard & 50% commodity rules. Fleeces will be examined for strength, length, handle and cleanliness (yield) as well as overall uniformity of the fleece.

1. Entries for Divisions 2 - 10 (Fruit and Nuts) will be received from 2-8 p.m. Wednesday, Sept. 10, 2025 and Thursday, Sept. 11, 2025.
2. Entries for Divisions 11 - 13 (Home Brew, Wine, Cider and Mead) will be received 10 a.m. - 2 p.m. Saturday, Sept. 6, 2025 at the Farm and Garden Building.
3. All entries are limited to Frederick County residents, except Division 1 is open to any exhibitor. Special rules apply for Divisions 11, 12, 13 & 14. See rule #1.
4. Exhibitors must purchase a Season Exhibitors Pass for \$12.
5. Exhibitors are not permitted more than one entry of each variety or kind in any of the classes.
6. Exhibitors are allowed **three items** on one ticket in all Divisions.
7. All fruits and nuts will be judged on basis of desirable and standard form, size, and color for the variety, also uniformity of form, size, and color of fruits exhibited. Freedom from damage and blemish caused by insects or disease, also condition of fruit will be given high consideration.
8. Refer to general rules & regulations for additional information.

### DIVISION 1 – HONEY AND BEESWAX

**Chairperson: Joyce Church & Robin Ward**

Kim Raide, President of Frederick County Beekeepers Association

### Rules & Regulations:

1. Displays may include pictures and charts, but not bakery products, canned goods or other food related items that could be edible by the public during display. Maximum width of display is 8 feet.
2. All honey and beeswax must be the property of the exhibitor and must have been produced by him/her within a 12-month period prior to entry.
3. All honey exhibited must have been gathered and ripened in a natural way by honeybees.
4. No exhibitor's name or label will be allowed on any entry except Classes 21 and 22.
5. All cut comb honey must be packed in clear cut comb boxes, measuring 4 1/8" x 4 1/8", or in clear round cut comb plastic containers approximately 4" in diameter, and for viewing entire comb portion.
6. A copy of the judge's score sheet will be provided for each entry at the close of the exhibition.
7. Competent judging is conducted. Judges may withhold prizes for insufficient merit and remove from public view any entry or part thereof which, in his/her opinion, discredits the exhibition.
8. A copy of the Standards for Honey Judging in Maryland is available upon request.
9. The exhibitor will select the class. If needed, assistance will be available for selecting the correct class. The superintendent/judge reserves the right to change the class selected, if necessary.
10. All extracted honey will receive equal points on color within the class.



11. Frame of honey must be supported vertically in a sealed rigid display case with transparent windows for viewing entire comb portion.
12. Bee craft includes drawings, paintings, pottery, needlework, batik, carvings, wax moldings depicting honey bees and beekeeping activities, etc.
13. All extracted honey entered in Classes 3-7 must be in standard one pound glass or clear plastic flat-faced standard honey jars.
14. All chunk honey (Class 10) and finely granulated honey (Class 12) must be in standard one pound round honey jars.
15. Pollen will be exhibited in one pound round or standard flat-faced honey jars, either glass or clear plastic jars. All pollen will be dried, one-half pound minimum or to fill line on jar (three jars) cleaned and dust free. Pollen entries may be of the single color or multi-color type but must be three of the same entry.
16. Propolis – two ounce minimum, cleaned and free of wax, honey and debris. Patted flat between wax paper sheets or in a plastic bag.
17. Gift packs must include one or more products of the hive but may also include other items that enhance the appeal or promote the use of hive products. Gift packs should be suitable for personal gift use regardless of commercial applications. The gift pack should be a box, basket, or other suitable container. Labels are permitted on gift packs, Classes 21-22.
18. Mailable gift packs must be prepared and displayed in a container and packing material that is suitable for shipping.
19. Honeybee related photography (Class 25) will be judged strictly on photographic content. Framing is optional but may enhance presentation points. Must arrive ready to hang, equipped with strong picture hanging wire.
20. **Beekeepers entering for the first time only (Class 28), may exhibit honey in one pint glass canning jars or one-pound standard glass or plastic flat-faced honey jars.**
21. Multiple entries per household/family will be allowed in Classes 3-26 and will be scored (judged) independently. However, only the highest ranked entry per household/family may be awarded. A ribbon/premium if other entries would be denied higher ranking due to the multiple entries.

**Stalk:** is thick with branches which have multiple flower heads, i.e., ageratum

**Stem or Spray:** Is thin with branches which have multiple flower heads, i.e., petunias

**Spike:** Is not branched with multiple flower heads, i.e., gladiolus and snap dragons

**Bloom:** One bloom per branch of foliage, i.e., marigold and zinnia

**Flower:** With foliage, one flower

**Everlasting:** Flowers with papery petals which retain some or all its color when dried, for winter decorations.

**Display of:** Several stems or plants neatly arranged.

# Dept. N – Food Preservation

## Rules & Regulations:

1. All Foods should be processed using a tested recipe. (Recipe sources – Ball Blue Book, USDA Complete Guide to Home Canning and So Easy to Preserve, or recipes found in pectin or other canning ingredients made by companies such as Kerr, Mrs. Wagg, Ball, etc.)
2. Label each jar lid:
  - a. Product Name
  - b. Processing time and method
  - c. Source of recipe
3. Fruits, pickled vegetables, and some tomatoes should be processed in a boiling water bath canner. Vegetables and some tomato products must be processed in a pressure canner.
4. Use only mason jars (note size according to class specifications) and 2-piece self-sealing lids.
5. Jars must be clean and have rings on – no rusty rings.
6. Canned fruits, vegetables, and meats must be exhibited in clear (un-tinted) standard canning quart or pint jars vacuum packed with screw tops; preserves, marmalades, butters and pickles in clear (un-tinted) standard half-pint jars vacuum packed with screw tops; jelly in standard jelly glasses (8 ounce) in standard one-half pint vacuum packed jars with screw tops.
7. No artificial coloring permitted, except jellies.
8. Canned goods must have been canned since last Fair, except dill pickles which may be a year old.
9. Any canned goods may be opened during judging.
10. No mayonnaise jars will be accepted.
11. Small ribbon stickers will be used during Fair for display. Upon pick up of item, exhibitors will be given regular ribbon.
12. Do not fill jars to top. (1/8" of top)

# Dept. T – Photography

## Rules & Regulations:

1. Open to Frederick County residents Only.
2. Photography entries are limited to 9 photographs per exhibitor.
3. The rules described herein apply to all photography whether color or black and white.
4. Photographs must be the work of the exhibitor. Photographs must be taken within the last year (Sept. 2024 – Sept. 2025).
5. Photographs previously submitted at The Great Frederick Fair will not be accepted for competition.
6. The photographer's name, address, telephone number and category must be on the back of each entry. Entries submitted by school age youth and entries student produced (student developed and printed) must include the exhibitors' age. Middle and high school student produced photography will be judged separately.
7. Entries with name or other markings on the front will not be accepted for competition.
8. Photographs in frames will not be accepted for competition.
9. Nude, obscene, or distasteful photographs will not be accepted for competition.
10. Exhibitors may enter only one photograph in each class. Once a particular



photograph has been entered into a class it cannot be entered again in another class.

11. Photographs must be 8" x 10", no other sizes will be accepted. All photos should be clear of free of any writing, including a camera recording date. All photographs, including digital photographs must be printed on photo paper. Photographs not printed on photo paper will be excluded from the competition.
12. Photographs must be SURFACE MOUNTED and CENTERED ON CLEAN STANDARD WHITE 11" x 14" photo mat board. Tag, Poster, or Foam boards are NOT acceptable. DO NOT USE OVERLAY MATS on the photographs. The photograph must be securely mounted to the mat board (must be mounted using rubber cement or permanent photo adhesive ONLY!) (Photo mat board may be purchased at the local framing and craft stores.)
13. Photographs which do not conform to all rules set forth herein will not be judged.
14. Interpretation of all rules are left to the discretion of the judge.

1. Judging will be based on flavor, texture, and appearance.
2. All Baked goods must be made from scratch unless otherwise noted.
3. Items to be placed on sturdy paper or Styrofoam plate.
4. All frostings must be made from scratch.
5. No meringue pies.
6. Only enter half a cake or loaf of bread.
7. Novelty cakes can be Styrofoam. They will not be cut.
8. Pies should be in foil pie plate.
9. The recipe must accompany all machine-made breads.
10. Only 2-layer cakes.
11. Cookies should be 2" or 3", no bigger.
12. Recipes recommended on all items.

Canned fruits, vegetables, and meats must be exhibited in clear, (un-tinted), standard canning quart of pint jars, vacuumed packed with screw tops; preserves\*, jams\*, marmalades\*, butters\*, and pickles in clear (un-tinted) standard half-pint jars vacuumed packed with screw tops; jelly in standard jelly glasses (8 ounce), sealed with paraffin or in standard one-half pint vacuumed packed jars with screw tops. (\*may be sealed with paraffin)
3. No artificial coloring permitted, except jellies.
4. Canned goods must have been canned since last fair, except dill pickles which may be a year old.
5. Any canned goods may be opened during judging.
6. NO MAYONNAISE JARS will be accepted.
7. Small ribbon stickers will be used during fair for display. Upon Pick up of item, exhibitor will be given regular ribbon.
8. Do not fill jars to top.

OPEN TO GFF YOUTH EXHIBITORS, FREDERICK COUNTY 4-H CLUBS  
AND FFA MEMBERS

## GENERAL RULES & REGULATIONS FOR YOUTH EXHIBITS & ACTIVITIES:

1. All Youth Exhibitors must be members in good standing of either The GFF Youth Program, 4-H or FFA in Frederick County.
2. County age requirement for youth: (Ages 8-18, as of January 1 of current year)
  - a. Animal Science Entries
    - i. Juniors (ages 8-10 by January 1 of current year)
    - ii. Intermediates (ages 11-13 by January 1 of current year)
    - iii. Seniors (ages 14-18 by January 1 of current year)
  - b. Building Entries
    - i. Juniors (ages 8-13 by January 1 of current year)
    - ii. Seniors (ages 14-18 by January 1 of current year)
3. Each exhibitor may make one entry in each class except where otherwise specified.
4. No entry fee is charged to youth exhibitors.
5. The Fair office will not be responsible for any exhibits.
6. Exhibits/animals will not be released during the Fair to attend other Fairs or shows.
7. Decisions of the department superintendents are final. Superintendents are a direct representative of The Great Frederick Fair and have authority to enforce all rules and regulations. Any formal complaints can be filed with the appropriate GFF Committee. Violations of any rule may result in forfeiting premiums and/or suspension or banning from current and future GFF events. If for any reason exhibitor dismissal is imposed, premiums and prize winnings are automatically forfeited.
8. All Youth Exhibitors will follow ALL GFF Rules and Guidelines, and all rules published in the Fair catalog
9. All entries must be entered electronically. No paper entry forms will be accepted by the Fair office.
10. Any Youth exhibitor found with alcoholic beverages or illegal drugs will be escorted from the Fairgrounds and will forfeit all premium monies. The fair, in its sole discretion, reserves the right to prohibit any drugs and associated paraphernalia whether illegal or legal to be on the fairgrounds or used on the fairgrounds, such as Maryjane, DBD, weed or pot, but not limited thereto.
11. The GFF Exhibitor Code of Ethics will be enforced by the appropriate Youth superintendents with their decision being final.
12. Youth exhibitors may receive a champion and/or reserve champion within the same section and/or class.

## EXHIBITOR ENTRY STATEMENT

13. All Exhibitors of the GFF upon entry submission agree to follow the rules and regulations of The Great Frederick Fair and the IAFE Code of Ethics. [www.thegreatfrederickfair.com/codeofethics](http://www.thegreatfrederickfair.com/codeofethics)



## RULES FOR ANIMAL YOUTH EXHIBITORS

14. Exhibits are due in their respective departments on the Fairgrounds at the specified arrival/release times in the Fair Book.
15. All breeding animals must be registered, or leased in the name of the enrolled Youth exhibitor of Frederick County on or before July 1 of the current year.
16. Registration and health papers must be presented and checked upon entering the Fair.
17. All market livestock that show by breed must have valid association paperwork and matching identification or the animal will be shown in the crossbred market class.
18. All entries must be in accordance with state health regulations, no exceptions.
19. All animals (except market animals and poultry) entered in the youth classes will be eligible to compete in the open classes, subject to rules of the open classes. Exhibitors must register in open class using the online entry system.
20. The exhibitor's area must be inspected for cleanliness by the respective superintendent(s) upon check out. All youth exhibitors are responsible for cleaning out their own pens regardless if they are showing in open class.
21. All exhibits will be housed as directed by superintendents. Pen assignments will be given during arrival times and must be followed by exhibitors. (No exceptions) Exhibitors must remain in their assigned pens.
22. For a breed designated show, a minimum of two exhibitors and five animals is required. This is at the discretion of the Fair livestock oversight committee & Superintendents.
23. To participate in a youth livestock showmanship class, the exhibitor must be showing livestock within that department to be eligible. The exhibitor must also use their own animal in showmanship classes.
24. Exhibitors may receive help from family members when fitting their animals for show. The youth exhibitor must be present and actively learning and helping fit their animal. **EXCEPTION** to this rule. Youth exhibitors are 100% responsible for fitting their own animals used in showmanship classes. They may only receive help from other youth exhibitors.
25. Immediate family may help with the daily care of the livestock. In the event there must be a substitution in the showing, the replacing youth must be a sibling or a Youth exhibitor participating in the same discipline at the GFF. The substitute youth must be the same age or younger than the owner of the animal. All substitutions must be discussed with the superintendent prior to the show. Youth exhibitors can only have substitutions in the show-ring when:
  - a. Youth exhibitor is injured, with a doctor's note
  - b. Youth exhibitor becomes injured during or the day of the event
  - c. Multiple entries in one class
  - d. Participating in two youth events simultaneously
  - e. Youth exhibitor is a GFF ambassador attending another event at the same time.
26. An exhibitor may exhibit one animal per Bred and Owned class upon meeting The GFF Youth Bred and Owned Criteria.
27. Bred and Owned Project Criteria for Youth exhibitors:
  - a. Youth exhibitor must carry the respective breeding project
  - b. Female must be solely owned by the Youth exhibitor. Registration papers must reflect ownership prior to breeding.
  - c. Youth exhibitor must submit complete breeding records for review by



- department superintendent or identified individual
- d. Youth exhibitor must designate the animal on registration papers as Bred and Owned animal

**YOUTH LIVESTOCK MARKET SALE RULES AND REGULATIONS:**

Refer to GFF Youth Livestock Rules & Regulations ([www.thegreatfrederickfair.com/youth](http://www.thegreatfrederickfair.com/youth)) {Rabbits & Turkeys; Goats, Beef, Sheep & Swine}- Animals will be released to the buyer after 9 a.m., Sunday following the Sale; any animals remaining after 10 a.m. will need to be removed from the barn by the seller. All sold animals must be outfitted with a collar/ halter to aid the buyer; if no collar/halter is on the animal, a \$5.00 fee may be deducted from the sale check.

**YOUTH EXHIBITOR MARKET ANIMAL DISCLAIMER:**

Youth exhibitors are encouraged to participate in all livestock sales in Frederick County. However, if a market animal is registered in another livestock auction, it is NOT eligible to show, or sell at The Great Frederick Fair. If an exhibitor shows an animal that is registered in another sale, that exhibitor forfeits all premiums and awards, as well as the privilege to participate in the Fair indefinitely.

**YOUTH CAKE AND BAKED GOODS SALE RULES:**

Refer to the Youth Baked Goods (Dept. 4U) for all baked goods rules. Failure to comply with all rules listed will result in immediate disqualification. All baked good items to be sold will be selected at the superintendents discretion.





# Bullying & Harassment Policy Among Exhibitors (adopted: 2017)

Everyone has the right to feel respected and be treated with dignity. The Great Frederick Fair encourages that exhibitors are to act in a courteous, honest manner, to provide an optimal competitive environment for achievement and be free from verbal assault, violence, and harassment. This includes both in the exhibit area and the show ring.

Superintendents establish clear behavior standards and make every effort to be aware of problems, provide proper guidance and supervision and consistently and fairly enforce policies. If a mutual agreement cannot take place. Then a letter must be sent with the superintendent of directly sent to the Fair office.

Bullying incidents, however, usually tend to occur out of sight of Fair-going public. While poor sportsmanship may also be interpreted as bullying or harassment, care should be taken, and clear narratives of any incident should be documented. A comprehensive approach that includes youth, youth leaders, parents, superintendents, show staff, and exhibitors has the most promise in reducing bullying. It is not helpful to simply tell a person to ignore bullying or encourage a person to fight the bully. It is important to report bullying because it may not stop without help.

1. **First Offense** – Letter of Reprimand
2. **Second Offense** – Dismissal from Fairgrounds
3. **Third Offense** – Permanent dismissal from Fairgrounds

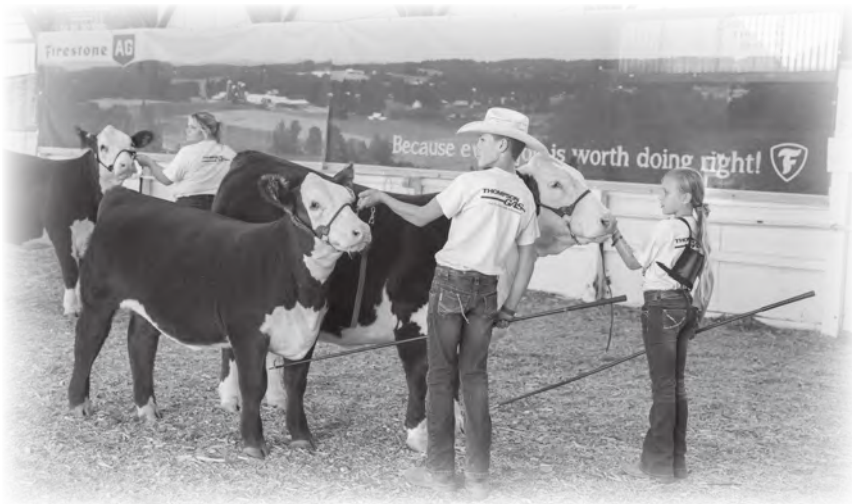

### **Rules & Regulations:**

1. Refer to all general rules on page 31 and general youth rules on page 134 for additional regulations.
2. Exhibitors can show a maximum of five market steers and are limited to no more than two per weight class per breed unless there are not enough steers at weigh-in for that breed, at which time the steer will be added to the cross or AOB class.
3. All animals must be registered in the recognized herd books of the respective breeds. If your breed is not listed, please enter All Other Breeds (AOB).
  - a. Any breeds with less than 6 animals (2 different exhibitors) will be switched to the AOB Division.
  - b. Regardless of the breed divisions listed above, the Beef Committee has full discretion to modify/change/switch animals between breed divisions based on entry numbers.
4. All registration information **MUST** be completed for all entries.
5. Any animal that is “dual” registered in both the beef and dairy breed books may be shown as either beef or dairy, but not both.
6. Breed declaration for multi-registered animals must occur by check-in. The animal must keep the same designation for the same breed in both the youth and open shows.
7. Senior Yearlings are eligible to be shown with natural calf at side but are not eligible to be shown as cow/calf pair.



8. Feeder calf classes are for heifers and steers only. Registered heifers shown as a feeder calf are considered terminal, therefore may not be shown in a breed class also.
9. Only animals competing as individuals are eligible to compete in group classes
10. No bulls allowed in any youth class.
11. All animals must have a scannable electronic RFID tag to be eligible to show, NO exceptions (this includes all prospect cattle). No EIDS will be available for exhibitors onsite.
12. All registered cattle MUST have Tattoos and EIDS. All cattle that are checked in without a tattoo in the ear matching registration papers will automatically be disqualified or show in the crossbred class for market.
  - a. Exhibitors must present a hard copy of the registration paper at the time of check-in. Electronic versions will not be accepted.
13. All steers must make weight requirements and be graded on site by the graders provided by The Great Frederick Fair. If an animal does not make weight and/or grade, that animal is permitted to go home immediately or stay for the week to be used in the showmanship class.
14. Showmanship - to participate in showmanship, the exhibitor must show their own animal and that animal must be shown in an individual class in the youth show.
15. Adhesives may be used, however, any product used to alter the conformation and/or appearance of the animal for exhibition is prohibited.
16. Blood, hair and urine samples may be drawn on all Champion and Reserve Champion Market animals immediately following the show.
17. No false hair, twinning or artificial fill is allowed (including pumping and drenching unless deemed medically necessary and performed by a Vet). Animals found in violation will be disqualified.
18. Butt fans are not permitted inside the barns, fans should be hung and allowed 2 animals per fan. No generators permitted inside the barns.
19. No chutes are permitted in the walkways of the barn. Chutes may be used in a pen area if space permits.

### **Additional Rules and Regulations:**

1. Youth turkey exhibitors must be present for judging.
2. There will be no farm flocks, and no classes for trios.
3. Premiums will be awarded to all varieties of poultry recognized in the standard of perfection, and ornamental varieties as well as non-standard breeds and varieties recognized distinctly as such by the superintendent.
4. Poultry exhibitors must comply with the Maryland Department of Agriculture Health Requirements for Poultry. Please refer to the first section of the fair catalog or visit <https://mda.maryland.gov/AnimalHealth/pages/fairs-shows.aspx>.
5. During exhibition, all specimens will be under the control of the superintendent and cannot be removed without authorization. A poultry technician will be on hand to make daily inspection of all birds on exhibition. Any bird showing signs of sickness or disease will be removed from the poultry barn.
6. The term "specimen" implies anything for which a premium is offered. The cock and hen are specimens hatched prior to 2025; cockerel and pullet are specimens hatched during 2025.
7. Any exhibits left in the building after 9 a.m., Sunday, Sept. 21 will be done so at the owner's risk.
8. Exhibitors are limited to 2 entries per variety, per breed for each class (for ex. 2 Barred Rock Hen, 2 Barred Rock Pullet, 2 White Rock Hen, etc.) with the exception of meat turkeys which you may only enter one.
9. Meat turkeys - Min. weight to be eligible for the livestock sale is 29lbs for toms and 21 lbs for hens. Any meat turkey weighing less than 20 lb (toms) and 15lbs (hens) will not be shown and may be sent home at the discretion of the superintendents.
10. The same type of egg may not be entered in more than one class. Eggs must be from youth exhibitors own flock.

### **Additional rules and regulations:**

1. Youth members are to enter Purebred Pedigreed rabbits. Breeding rabbits must be in the name of the youth member by August 1st of the current year. Market Roasters must be in the name of the youth member by June 15th of the current year. Rabbits must be on the members Rabbit Breed Inventory, turned into the fair office by August 1st.
2. All rabbits must be 12 weeks of age to be eligible for show, The exceptions are market meat pen and fryers that are to be born between July 5-19, 2025.
3. All rabbits must be permanently tattooed in the left ear at least 1 month prior to fair. Tattoos must be healed, dry, legible and accurate prior to entering the rabbit.
4. Market rabbits must have pedigree at check-in. Incomplete or missing pedigrees will not be accepted.
5. No changes after Sept. 1st of the current year. Changes to entries must be submitted to the Superintendent.
6. Breeding rabbit entries are limited to four entries per exhibitor, per variety, per class, not to exceed a total of 50 entries. Some rabbits may be released depending on space. All rabbit exhibitors will be required to keep some rabbits at the fair on exhibition. There will be no fur classes.
7. At check-in, youth members are to bring Rabbit's Self Certification of Animal Health completed for all rabbits entered. All rabbits will be health checked upon entry. Any rabbits showing signs of poor health will be refused entry.
8. Any rabbits, excluding rabbits sold at the livestock sale, removed from the exhibition building before the official Sunday release time will cause the exhibitor to forfeit.



- feit all premiums. Any animals sold during the week of the fair must be exchanged made off the fairgrounds property after release. A rabbit superintendent may release rabbits prior to Sunday for health reasons including Saturday after entering.
9. Youth members must come in at least once a day to check rabbits and water them. Shavings will be provided to put in all wet cages. Supply containers may be stored in the rabbit shed. Rules regarding the cleaning and care of all rabbits will be enforced.
  10. Bowls are to be at least a half pint or one pint in size and non-tipping. No ceramic, glass or tuna type cans are to be used for food or water in cages. No glass bottles. Containers will NOT be provided. Be sure to have containers for both food and water for each entry. Entries without proper size containers will not be allowed to enter.
  11. Rabbits will be judged by ARBA Guidelines.
  12. Youth exhibitors must be present on the day of the show and in official show attire. Showmanship will be conducted and judged throughout the Rabbit show on Sunday.
  13. Exhibitors will forfeit any/all premiums if noncompliant with any rules set by the fair or superintendent.
  14. Market entries are limited to four individual meat rabbits and two meat pen entries, in addition to entries listed in rule 6 above.
  15. Meat Rabbit Definitions:
    - a. Fryer: a commercial breed rabbit no more than 10 weeks old (70 days) from market weigh-in on 9/13/25, born between 7/5/25 and 7/19/25. They are to weigh a minimum of 3 1/2 lbs (3lbs 8oz), maximum of 5 1/2 lbs (5lbs 8oz). Fryers must be raised by the exhibitor. They cannot be purchased.
    - b. Roaster: a commercial breed rabbit no more than 180 days old from market weigh-in on 9/13/25 (born no earlier than 3/17/25). They are to weigh a minimum of 5 1/2 lbs (5lbs 8oz), maximum of 9 lbs.
    - c. Meat Pen: consists of three rabbits of the same breed and variety, no more than 10 weeks old (70 days) from market weigh-in on 9/13/25, born between 7/5/25 and 7/19/25. They are each to weight a minimum of 3 1/2 lbs (3lbs 8oz), maximum of 5 1/2 lbs (5lbs 8oz). Pointed animals must have the same point color. Broken meat pens must also be of the same variety. A meat pen does not necessarily have to come from the same litter. Meat pens must be raised by the exhibitor. They cannot be purchased.
  16. Meat pen and individual meat classes may be broken down by weight based on volume of entries. This will be determined after weigh-in.
  17. Rabbits shown in market classes (Fryer, Roaster or Meat Pen) may not be entered in any other classes.
  18. There is a mandatory market sale meeting following check-in on Sat. Sept. 13th at 12:30pm.
  19. Weigh-in for all market rabbits will be after the market sale meeting. All exhibitors must be present during weigh-in.

#### **Additional Market Rabbit Sale Guidelines:**

20. Must be a member in good standing of 4-H, FFA or The GFF Youth Program.

## General Rules & Regulations:

1. All Youth Exhibitors must be members in good standing of either The GFF Youth Program, 4-H or FFA in Frederick County.
2. Age requirement for youth building: (Ages 8-18, as of Jan. 1 of current year)
  - a. Juniors (ages 8-13 by January 1 of current year)
  - b. Seniors (ages 14-18 by January 1 of current year)
3. All Youth Exhibitors will follow ALL GFF Rules and Guidelines, and all rules published in the Fair catalog.
4. All entries including club entries and sprouts, must be entered electronically through ShoWorks by the August 15th deadline. Walk-in entries will not be accepted.
5. Each exhibitor may make one entry in each class. Duplicate entries may not be made in multiple classes, divisions, and/or departments. This includes club entries. **Exception:** 4ZZ (Sprouts) may have a total of 5 entries/exhibitor.
6. No item can be exhibited a second year. Each entry must be made by exhibitor and represent work completed since the previous Fair. **Exceptions:** entries and collections which have been added to (example: leaf, insect collections, sewing samples.)
7. No entry fee is charged to youth exhibitors.
8. The Fair office and Youth Building will not be responsible for any exhibits.
9. Superintendents reserve the right to move entries to the correct dept./class if entered incorrectly.
10. All entries must be entered in an individual youth exhibitor's name. **Exception:** Department 4Z (Club Entries) will be entered by the club leader in the club's name.
11. Decisions of the department/building superintendents are final. Any continued opposition may result in disqualification of the entry. Any formal complaints can be filed with the appropriate GFF Committee. It is also The Great Frederick Fair's policy to forfeit all premiums and prize winnings if for any reason exhibitor dismissal is imposed.
12. Conference judging is only guaranteed for 4 entries per department. Youth exhibitors may be granted more conference judging opportunities based on judge availability. Conference judging will conclude at 12:30pm sharp each Sat. For exhibitors with more than 4 entries in a department, please identify the 4 for conference judging BEFORE arriving to intake. Entries that exceed the 4 limit will be collected by the department superintendents and be judged without the exhibitor present.
13. Bring all entries with the tags attached, and a copy of your entries to the Youth Building (Bldg. 12) on the days and times specified. (Youth exhibitors are responsible for printing and bringing their own entry tags.) Contact the Fair office if you need a How To Guide.
14. Upon arrival at the building, proceed to the welcome table. Youth Ambassadors will be available to help exhibitors to their respective departments. No adults are permitted in the youth building during entry intake unless given permission by the building superintendent.
15. Exhibits are due according to the schedule listed at the end of the rules and regulation section.



16. All premium checks will go directly to the youth exhibitor except for 4Z (Club Entries) which go to the club.
17. In addition to these rules, please see department specific rules.

#### **Entry Judging - All departments EXCEPT 4U, 4Z and 4ZZ:**

The following guidelines are in place for entry judging for all departments. **Exception:** 4U (Baked Goods), 4Z (Club Entries), and 4ZZ (Sprouts).

1. Junior and Senior entries do not compete against each other. Champions will be selected for each age group.
2. Entries in the Youth Building will be judged using the danish system earning a blue, red, or white ribbon. If an entry does not meet the rules specified for that dept. the judging process will start at a red, not a blue.
3. Participation ribbons will be used to recognize entries that are submitted but fail to meet requirements. Premiums are not awarded to participation ribbons.
4. Each class will have an overall and reserve champion (champions - ribbon only).
5. Each division will have an overall and reserve champion (champions - ribbon only) selected from the class champions.
6. Each department will have an overall and reserve champion (champions - ribbon only) selected from the division champions.
7. Department champions are eligible for Best In Show. Best in Show selections will be made by GFF Board Members.
8. Department superintendents and judges reserve the right to not award class or division champions based on the quality of entries submitted.
9. When selecting Division, Department and Best in Show Reserve Champions, the reserve champion exhibit from the same division/dept. as the overall champion may be pulled to compete (I.e. Division 1 champion is selected as the Dept. Champion. The Reserve Champion for Division 1 may be pulled to compete against the other Division Champions for Department Reserve Champion).
10. Conference judging is an opportunity for all youth but is only mandatory for 4W (Youth Home Furnishings and Family Life) Division 1 - Table Settings.

#### **Entry Judging - Departments 4U1(Cakes/Pies) and 4U2 (Baked Goods):**

The following judging guidelines are in place for entry judging in Department 4U1 and 4U2.

1. Junior and Senior entries do not compete against each other. Champions will be selected for each age group.
2. Entries in Youth Building will be judged using the danish system earning a blue, red, or white ribbon. If an entry does not meet the rules specified for that dept. the judging process will start at a red, not a blue.
3. Participation ribbons will be used to recognize entries that are submitted but fail to meet requirements. Premiums are not awarded to participation ribbons.
4. Each class will have an overall and reserve champion (champions - ribbon only).
5. Each division will have an overall and reserve champion (champions - ribbon only) selected from the class champions.
6. For Department 4U1 (Cakes/Pies), the junior and senior division champions will be judged against each other for a single overall champion cake and overall champion pie (champions - ribbon only).
7. For Department 4U2 (Baked Goods) placings above division champion will not be awarded.
8. Department superintendents and judges reserve the right to not award class or



division champions based on the quality of entries submitted.

9. Exhibitors are guaranteed conference judging on 4 total entries in Dept. 4U1 (Cakes/Pies) and 4 total entries in Dept. 4U2 (Baked Goods).

### **Youth Cake, Pie and Baked Goods Sale Rules and Information:**

The following rules, in addition to general, judging, and department rules are in place.

1. Failure to comply with ALL Rules listed will result in immediate disqualification from the sale.
2. Cakes/Pies receiving a blue or red ribbon are eligible for sale. **Exception:** The Programs Coordinator, in conjunction with the Youth Building Superintendent, reserve the right to limit the number of sale items per exhibitor based on final number of qualifying sale items.
3. Cakes/Pies receiving a white ribbon are not eligible for the sale.
4. Cupcakes from 4U1 (Division 1, class 13) receiving a blue or red ribbon will be grouped together into lots and sold at a flat price during the sale.
5. Baked Goods from 4U2 (Divisions 3-6 Only) receiving a blue or red ribbon will be grouped together into lots and sold at a flat price during the sale. Division 1 and 2 entries will not be sold.
6. Eligible sale items by exhibitor and sale order will be posted in the Youth Building by noon day of sale. Any scheduling conflicts that could impact sale order because of other fair participation (i.e. animal shows) should be discussed with the Building Superintendent upon entry intake on Saturday. Movement of items in the sale order is not guaranteed.

3. If you are participating in a youth event at The MD State Fair and/or Thurmont and Emmitsburg Community Show on Sept. 6th, early drop off will be in place on Wednesday September 3rd, 5pm-7pm. **Exception:** 4W (Home Furnishings) Division 1 - Table Settings is not eligible for early drop off.
4. Exhibitors opting to bring their entries early due to State Fair or T&E Community Show for 4W (Home Furnishings) Division 1 - Table Settings are forfeiting their opportunity for conference judging and will receive a participation ribbon only. Exhibits will be displayed based on space availability.
5. Early drop off is **ONLY** for exhibitors identified in rule #3. All other exhibitors must bring entries during normal intake hours. *(State Fair and T&E Community show will provide a list of exhibitors)*
6. Entries may be dropped off by a parent/friend on the proper intake day for the



exhibitor. Conference judging will not be provided. The youth building is not responsible for lost/misplaced/incorrectly entered entries.

Each specimen should have a label which indicates where and when it was collected and the collector’s name. Labels should not exceed 1/2” x 1”.
3. One or more boxes with pinning bottom may be used. Boxes should be at least 5” x 8” in size and covered with glass or another transparent top.
4. Most specimens should be collected and mounted by the exhibitor. Some specimen trading is allowed as long as the original collector’s label is retained.
5. Collections will be judged on accuracy in naming and grouping by order, number and variety of species, and neatness in labeling and arrangement.
6. A substantial number (i.e., at least 25) of new specimens should have been collected during the previous year.
7. A glass - headed pin should be placed next to each insect collected during the previous year.
8. Each collection must be accompanied with a 3” x 5” card containing the following:
  - a. Number of specimens in the collection
  - b. Number of orders in the collection
  - c. Number of specimens collected within the previous year

2. Any item that is sold shelf stable but required refrigeration after opening may not be used in cake frosting/icing and glazes.

Examples include but are not limited to: milk (all types - cow, goat, soy, almond, etc.), half & half, cream evaporated milk, cream cheese, eggs (whites, yolk or whole), egg substitutes, powdered eggs, meringue powder.

Additional ribbons (i.e. class/division champions) may be awarded judges and superintendents discretion. 8. Entries will be displayed on metal risers and/or standing metal grid panels/racks. Entries will be reviewed after submission on August 31st and display areas will be assigned.
9. Clubs/chapters are responsible for display of all subject items in these areas. Clips for affixing must be displayed in a manner that removes the change of entries falling or inducing safety concerns.
10. Clubs/chapters are invited to decorate their areas to further promote their program. Decorations may not extend more than 1 foot beyond the metal risers and if within metal panels/racks, must not extend beyond middle divider.

## Frequently Asked Questions:

### What happens after I buy an animal?

Once you have purchased an animal, you will be asked to select a processor. This is where the animal will be taken to be harvested for meat products and you will be contacted by the processor when your order is ready to be picked up.

### Where does my money go?

100% of the money goes to the youth exhibitor to help them purchase their next project, pay for feed, and everything else their projects entail.

### How do I transport the animal that I purchased?

The sale committee and volunteers take care of hauling the livestock to the processor.

### Can I support the youth, but not take the animal?

YES! You can purchase an animal and donate it back to either the youth exhibitor or donate it back to another organization. We also have the option for buyers to give “add-ons” directly to the youth which will be added to their sale check.

### Is my purchase tax deductible?

In most cases there are tax advantages, but everyone’s situation is different. The fair is a 501c-5.

### Can a company or business buy an animal?

Businesses are more than welcome to purchase an animal. This is a great way to promote your business or company. Many will have the animal processed and use the meat as gifts for employees, company picnics, etc.

### How can I pay?

Major credit cards, checks and cash are accepted.
